Dear Chair,

I write to convey my interest in serving on the South Hadley School Committee. I am the parent of a student in the second grade at Mosier Elementary and I have been a resident of South Hadley since 2006.

I will bring to the position several years of experience as an educator on two continents, as well as a deep commitment to public education. From 1994-2003, I taught Economics and English to high school students in Ghana before moving to the United States for graduate study in Economics at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst. I am currently a faculty member at Hampshire College and the University of Massachusetts, Amherst.

As an educator, I understand the challenges that confront teachers, administrators and staff as they contend with dwindling resources emanating from cuts to public education budgets. As an economist who believes deeply in the value of public education, I think of investments in our schools as investments in our community as well as investments in the public good. Rather than thinking of investments in our schools as a drain on the resources of the town, I prefer to bring attention to the ways in which the town as a whole benefits from these investments. Finally, as a parent, I am keenly aware of the importance of the work of the School Committee to the smooth functioning of the school district and to the well-being of the students and staff of our schools. I hope that you will consider offering me the opportunity to join you in doing this important service to our community.

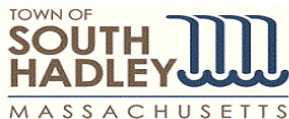

Town Administrator's Report to Selectboard January 18, 2021

Administration, Finance and Operations

- The Selectboard is seeking citizens with diverse interests and abilities to apply for these available positions. There are no special requirements for any of the boards and committees other than a willingness to serve. *However, applicants must be registered to vote in the Town of South Hadley.* The deadline to apply is February 10th and applicants can find vacancies and apply at <https://www.southhadley.org/CivicAlerts.aspx?AID=613>
- As part of the ongoing transparency of the Police Department, both call and arrest logs are posted to the Town's website. The department also posts their Professional Standards, Policy & Procedures Manual and other important information. <https://www.southhadley.org/320/Police-Department>
- The requests for proposals for the American Rescue Plan Act funds that South Hadley is receiving will be live on the town website starting Tuesday, January 18th. The Town is seeking proposals that fit into ten eligible categories for projects from now until December 31, 2024.

Community Highlights

- The Senior Center re-opened with limited services on January 10. Lunches will remain curbside for January and certain activities will have limited capacity due to COVID. - The Fireside Chats at the Senior Center (formerly Coffee and Conversation) that was to take place on January 7 with the Town Administrator will be postponed to February 4.

- The South Hadley and Granby Chamber of Commerce will be hosting their Annual Meeting on January 19th (February 2nd is the inclement weather date).
- The Orchards Golf Club will be celebrating its 100th anniversary with a gala planned for May 20th at the Berkshire Hills Music Academy. The venue also happens to be the former residence of Joseph Skinner, the founder of The Orchards.
- The annual Bag the Community has been postponed due to COVID. The SHHS Student Council will be hosting a replacement community activity when the current

health risks are eliminated. According to their postponement message “Unfortunately, the needs of our neighbors cannot be postponed. Please consider a donation to Neighbors Helping Neighbors Food Pantry.”

Planning and Economic Development

- The Pioneer Valley Planning Commission will be soliciting written requests from their 43 member communities for their District Local Technical Assistance program. Priority categories include affordable housing, shared/regional service projects and responding to COVID-19.
- E-Ink has submitted to both Planning and Conservation plans for a redevelopment project at 7 Gaylord Street. They are proposing demolition and rebuilding the northernmost part of their existing building as well as stormwater improvements. Public Health

- 244 active confirmed cases as of 1/11. This only includes PCR test results. Last week the confirmed case count was 130. Unfortunately the Town is reporting an additional death due to COVID-19, bringing the total deaths to 67.
- The state has launched a tool that allows people who received their vaccination in Massachusetts to access their own vaccination history and generate a COVID-19 digital vaccine card, which would contain similar vaccination information to a paper CDC card. The Administration is not requiring residents to show proof of vaccination to enter any venue, but this tool will help residents who would like to access and produce a digital copy of their record. Access the new tool at MyVaxRecords.Mass.Gov.

Public Works

- Recycling was behind a half day on several occasions in the past two weeks stemming from a shortage of workers due to COVID. The DPW assisted Republic to catch up before an incoming storm.
- The Town has spent over \$63, 812 on snow and ice removal for the last 8 storm events. The tally does not yet include another order for salt that will be made.

On July 24, 2021, William Carmody was delivering mail at 4 Miami St. when a brown pit bull type dog charged at him. William stomped his feet and yelled at the dog trying to get the dog to retreat. The dog did not so William used his OC spray. The dog retreated to the back of the mail van and then turned and charged at him again.

Officers Boyle responded to the area of Miami St followed the dog to 4 Miami St where they found the dog and the owner Brenda Chapdelaine. It took both Officers Tebo and Boyle to get the dog close enough to 4 Miami St where the owner was able to get the dog into the back yard. The dog in question is a mixed Pitbull and is named Brody.

On July 25, 2021, I spoke with Mr. Chapdelaine and informed him that the dog had to be placed on a runner that can hold a pull of 300lbs. or that he had to move the fence closer to the cack door incase the dog gets out without their knowledge. I was informed that he was in the process of having the fence moved.

On September 15, 2021, I received a call from dispatch informing the dog at 4 Miami St is out again and that the mailman is refusing to deliver mail on Miami St or the abutting St. I was informed that the owners were unable to get the dog back into the house for quite some time.

I would later respond to 4 Miami St and spoke with Mrs. Chapdelain about her dog. She stated the dog got out without her knowing it. I again expressed my concern for the neighbors that live in the neighborhood and that she needed to get the fence in place. I was informed that she has tried.

I explained that I would be writing a report to the board of select persons with the following:

That the dog be confined to a fenced in yard or a runner that can withstand at least 300lbs of pull. I would recommend that the dog always have a muzzle on when and if the owners are walking the dog and that it be only on a three-foot leash (3) withstanding a 300lb pull. I would also recommend that the owners obtain at least a hundred thousand insurance policy should the dog bite someone.

A copy of this report has been given to the owners as well as a warning violation # 1108 MA
General Law: Section 140 Section 167, dog restrained.

I arrived and knocked on the door several times and Brenda would not answer the door. This is an ongoing problem when the dog gets out Brenda nor her husband Robert answer the door. On this day there was only one car in the driveway which leads me to believe Robert was not home.

On October 3, 2021, Officer Kretchmar spoke with Yarita Rodriguez regarding a dog that had bitten her son Miguel Cruz. The dog in question is a part mix Pitbull color brown named Brody. The owner is Robert and Brenda Chapdelaine of 4 Miami St. This incident happened on October 2, 2021, around 7pm while Miguel was riding his bike. According to Miguel the dog charged at him and bit him in the left leg. Miguel did not notice that the skin had been broken until he had gotten home later that evening. Miguel spoke to the owner (Chapdelaine) but did not obtain any information. Officer Kretchmar went to 4 Miami St. and spoke with Brenda regarding her dog biting Miguel. Brenda stated she knew nothing of the incident but would have her husband contact the station when he wakes up. Officer Kretchmar contacted ACO Steven Mailhott and informed him of the incident.

On October 4, 2021, Officer Kretchmar went back to 4 Miami St to speak with Chapdelaine because he did not receive a call. When he arrived at 4 Miami St. Brenda was out chasing her dog as he again got out. Officers also tried to get the dog and it lunged at Officer Whelihan as he was able to get the dog leash. This incident went on for at least one hour.

Officer Kretchmar told Brenda to wake up her husband. Robert stated he never spoke with Miguel and was not aware the dog was loose. (It should be known that I have caught both Brenda and Robert in multiple lies regarding their dogs).

Ms. Rodriguez and Miguel came to the station on October 5, 2021, and was shown a photo of the dog. Miguel was 90% sure that it was Chapdelaine's dog that had bitten him.

On October 6, 2021, ACO Steven Mailhott spoke with Officer Kretchmar and informed him that a 10 day quarantine order is in hand and he would be issuing said quarantine. (It should be known that I am the main ACO and was on vacation in Wyoming during this time. However, I was notified of everything that went on regarding the incident daily by ACO Steven Mailhott, Board of Health Sharon Hart and Jennifer Jernigan).

ACO Steven Mailhott tried to issue the quarantine on several days and several times during the day. He informed me that both cars are in the driveway but know one answers the door. I informed ACO Steven Mailhott to tape it to the door. ACO Steven Mailhott called both Brenda

and Roberts phone and left messages for them to contact him regarding the dog being on quarantine. Neither of them called him. It was two days after the quarantine was up that Brenda called and left a message that she was returning his call. Steven tried for several days calling her back but no one answered.

ACO Steven Mailhott was able to get her to answer the door after several attempts. He checked the dogs rabies records two were up now up to date. However, he was informed that Brody and Poochie their younger dog was not six months old and did not need shots as of yet. He again informed them that the dogs are still not licensed in town. **Brenda played dumb again stating she did not know and would speak to her husband.** Brenda and Robert were both told by me to ge the dogs licensed several times. It has been brought to my attention that the third dog still has not shots and is not licensed. According to information given to me Stafford Veterinary Center Juliette has only a distemper shot on 8-27-2021 and is 17 months old.

On October 26, 2021, at 9am I went to 4 Miami St to issue the following citations. Two cars were in the driveway, dogs were barking and no one answered the door. I returned at 3pm no answer one car in driveway. I left citation taped to door. Fence is still not up to prevent dogs from leaving the yard.

- 1) Failure to have dog on leash / No owner of a pet/domesticated animal shall allow the pet/domesticated animal to roam at large upon a public walk or street or upon the private property of another.
- 2) Failure to have dogs licensed

On October 19, 2021, Officer Pratt was dispatched to the area of Los Angeles St for a report of a loose dog that had bit a driving instructor on the hand. The reporting party is Ann Edwards of 12 Las Angeles St. She obtained this inform her daughter Shelby after her driving lesson. According to Ann the driving instructor did not want to press charges and would not give any information to Ann. The dog is again described as a brown dog dragging its leash.

Officer Pratt observed Brenda Chapdelaine of 4 Miami St. trying to get the dogs leash which took time and eventually was successfully and brough the dog into the house. This dog is a mixed Pitbull named Brody.

ACO Steven Mailhott was advised of the situation and responded to 4 Miami St to speak with Brenda and Robert. As in the past both cars were in the driveway and no one would answer the door.

On November 27, 2021 at 5:01 on the Amazon driver was delivering a package at 6 Miami St. which is owned by the complainant Candance Pennington and Joanne Marcoux. As the drive was placing the package on the deck Chapdelain's dog came at him barking and growling at the driver. The driver was now placed in fear and was stuck on the deck.

Brenda heard the commotion and went next door and tried to grab the dog's leash. According to the homeowners, it appears that Brenda again does not take this matter seriously and laughed at the situation to include the way the dog was barking the driver. Brenda grabbed the leash and brought the dog back to her house.

On November 29, 2021, I was contacted by the station and was informed that the dog from 4 Miami St was out again. This dog is owned by Brenda and Robert Chapdelaine. The dog's name is Brody and is a mixed Pitbull and has been terrorizing the neighborhood for months. I responded to 4 Miami St knowing that the owners would be trying to get the dog into the house before I get there. I contacted the station and requested officer and the supervisor to meet me at that residence. I pulled into the driveway and went to the door where I met Brenda coming out with a leash. I asked where the dog was. Brenda stated she and her husband are out looking for it. I informed her that he dog may have bit another dog. Brenda replied, "No Brody would never do that. I informed her that the dog was not going back to her house and an officer was standing by should her husband find the dog.

I went on to tell her that she was going to be receiving another citation for not having the dog leashed and allowing it to run around. That this time it will be in hand and that I would not be leaving it on the door as I did in October. Brenda stated she did not have any citation left on her door an smiled.

As I was leaving, I noticed seven (7) neighbors hanging around the property owned by Chapdelaine. I spoke with them and they advised me at **enough is enough**. That they are fed up with not being able to walk the neighborhood without being in fear that Brody is going to bite someone again or attach another dog. They explained that the Chapdelaine's cannot control the dog. That they put the dog on a leash outside the door and that is when the dog gets away and is always dragging its leash.

On July 25, 2021, I spoke with Brenda and explained she was to comply with the following:

That the dog be confined to a fenced in yard or a runner that can withstand at least 300lbs of pull. I would recommend that the dog always have a muzzle on when and if the owners are walking the dog and that it be only on a three-foot leash (3) withstanding a

300lb pull. I would also recommend that the owners obtain at least a hundred thousand insurance policy should the dog bite someone.

A copy of this report has been given to the owners as well as a written warning violation # 1108 MA General Law: Section 140 Section 167, dog restrained. None of this was complied with. Se was also ordered to get the third dog its rabies shot. As of this date it still had not been don. Chapdelaine's have said the dog is not six months old, however, we have information which says the dog is 1 months old.

At one point I was informed that they were waiting for Fairview Fence to come and enclose the area from the door to the existing fence. Then it was Fairview Fence was to busy and they were going to have a relative do it. Still not done as of this date.

I drove around the neighborhood and about 15 minutes later I saw Robert at the end of Michael Dr and Hillside Ave. He had his doors open and he was trying to call the dog into the car. I informed Robert that he was not taking the dog home. That the dog was coming with me. For 15 minutes I tried to catch the dog with a "Catch ALL POLE". This is used so the dog can not bite you. **(Robert did nothing but stand by his car saying Brody come boy, come into the car).** I contacted the station and requested officer come to my location to assist me with getting the dog. The dog eventually went into Robert's car. Robert tried to driveway; however, I would not let him close the driver's door. I again I informed him the dog was not going with him. I also informed him that if needed I would have the officers contact the on-call judge and let him make the decision. That this dog is a danger to every animal and person it comes in contact with. Robert eventually stated he would relinquish the dog to me. I informed him that the there are to options to consider that I recommend that the dog be euthanized or that he allow me to take control of the dog and I try to find a home for it.

I would later speak with Officer Helms who lives up the road from Chapdelain on 10 Tamps St. He informed be that he witnessed prior to me getting there Brody tried to attack his neighbors dog and the lady walking the dog on he own property.

I met with Michelle Demears who lives at 11 Tamps St. Michelle stated while she and her dog were in the front yard Brody came up the street barking, growng and was trying to bite her dog. Michelle stated she had to keep slamming her flashlight on the ground to keep Brody from biting her dog and herself. Michelle went on to say that the dog was now circling around her and her dog. Michelle was now feeling threatened by the dog's actions. Michelle stated this is an ongoing problem since June of this year when the Chapdelain's moved into the neighborhood. She stated the Chapdelain's can not control the dog.

During all the yelling Michelle stated Officer Helms came out of his house and had to grab a rake and went to help Michelle. During this time Robert came up the street and tried to grab the dog but it took off. Robert told Officer Helms and Michell they should go into their houses because the dog needs to run. Michelle stated that the dog has been terrorizing the neighborhood for month. Michelle stated that she and her neighbor do not feel safe.

Since July myself and my partner have tried to work with the Chapdelaines regarding the dogs. Bothe Brenda and Robert have not respect for the neighbors. They refuse to have the fence connected to the back door and always have an excuse. They still do not have liability insurance should the dog attack another person or dog. They were told to have a 300 lb runner and have not complied with that. They were told to have the dog muzzled and have refused to do that. They were told to have the dog on a leash that can withstand a pull of 300 lb. and have not complied with that. Whenever they are confronted about the dog it is a joke to them and always have an excuse.

The owners were informed to have all dogs up to date with rabies back in July. They have not complied with their dog named Juliette and they say she is not 6 months old when we have information that the dog is 17 months old.

The owners were informed to have all dogs registered with the town. They just did this a month ago.

The owners refuse to answer the door when my partner or myself try to speak with them or give them paperwork (ie) quarantine and citations. After the dog bit Miguel the quarantine had to be left on the door and the owners would not return any call until 2 days after the quarantine was up. Only they did she call ACO Steven Mailhott and left a message she was returning his calls.

A written warning was issued to Brenda on July 25, 2021, # 1108 MA General Law: Chapter 140 Section 174B, dog restrained.

On October 26, 2021, a citation was written by me for the following violations: I tried to deliver this citation in person but know one answer the door. Both cars were in the driveway and the dogs were barking. After returning at 3pm only one car was in the driveway and the TV was on however no one would answer the door. I left the citation taped to the door.

- 1) Failure to have dog restrained. Chapter 140 section 174B. Section 174B. Whoever is the owner or keeper of a dog shall restrain said dog by a chain or leash when in an officially designated public highway rest area. Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.

This fine was in the amount of \$100.00

- 2) Failure to have dogs licensed. Chapter 140 section 173A. The fine for the first offense committed by a person shall be \$50. The fine for a second offense shall be \$100. The fine for a third offense shall be \$300. For a fourth or subsequent offense, the fine shall not excide \$500.

This fine was in the amount of \$50.00 X 3 dogs total \$150.00. citation # 1095

On November 28, 2021, I have issued a citation for failure to have dog restrained in the amount of \$100.00 Citation # 1096

On November 29, 2021, I have issued a citation for failure to have dog restrained in the amount of \$100.00. Citation # 1097

Also a second citation in the amount of \$100.00 for failure to have the 17 month old dog registered Citation # 1097

With the evidence before you it is my opinion that neither Robert nor Brenda Chapdelaine are not capable of controlling their mixed breed Pitbull color brown. The dog does not listen to them. It will not come when it is called. The dog tried to attack other dogs and to include it is bitten two persons within the last month. They have been given every chance to comply with the laws of Massachusetts Chapter 140 and with the Town of South Hadley by-laws. The dog is a threat to everyone in the neighborhood to include other animals. They were also told to have the dog muzzled when it goes out. This has not been done as most of the time the dog is out running with a leash on and no muzzle.

This dog meets the criteria for both a nuisance dog and a vicious dog

I recommended that the Chapdelaine's obtain a hundred-thousand-dollar insurance policy in case the dog bites someone. Under Chapter 140 Section 157. that the owner or keeper of the dog provide proof of insurance in an amount not less than \$100,000 insuring the owner or keeper against any claim, loss, damage or injury to persons, domestic animals or property resulting from the acts, whether intentional or unintentional, of the dog or proof that reasonable efforts were made to obtain such insurance if a policy has not been issued; provided, however, that if a policy of insurance has been issued, the owner or keeper shall produce such policy upon request of the hearing authority or a justice of the district court; and provided further, that if a policy has not been issued the owner or keeper shall produce proof of efforts to obtain such insurance; **This was not done.**

It is my first recommendation that the Chapdelaine's turn over the dog to me so that I may be able to place it with a shelter so that it may be able to be placed with a home where someone can care for it, or my second recommendation that the dog be euthanized.

On November 28, 2021 at approximately 6pm my wife and I heard a sudden flurry of activity and loud yelling and screaming coming from our neighbor's house across the street. We could see the light of a flashlight waving all over the place and I instantly feared that my neighbor Michelle was being attacked by either a person or an animal. Michelle brings her dogs out several times over the course of a day and has done so for over 10 years in the same manner, but I had never heard her yelling like this. As I moved toward my front door, I could hear a larger dog barking aggressively and I realized instantly that it was likely the medium sized brown dog that routinely escapes from its home at 4 Miami St.

As I exited my residence, I witnessed this dog that is very familiar to me from several prior interactions standing approximately 8-10 feet away from Michelle on the side of her yard closest to 13 Tampa St. Michelle was in between this dog and one of her own dogs trying to "shoo" it away, but this dog was not retreating and instead was barking aggressively at Michelle and baring its teeth as it was lunging towards her direction. The dog was not running at Michelle at this time, however it was slowly advancing towards her as she retreated backwards to her front door. I went to get a rake that I had located close to my garage in order to try and fend the dog off, and in the time it took me to retrieve the rake the dog had not retreated at all. My next door neighbor had come outside by this time, as had several other neighbors, and he and I approached the dog in an attempt to get it away from Michelle and her yard. As we began to cross the street, the dog turned around and took off towards Miami St. I followed the dog's path as I knew there were several other neighbors out at this time and wanted to ensure their safety as well.

At this time, I encountered the dog's owner on Miami St. and questioned him as to the situation this time that resulted in his dog escaping again. The owner claimed that he broke free from his collar and that their fencing is insufficient to maintain the dog in their yard. The owner tried to claim that the dog is not aggressive, however I know that to be incorrect. As a police officer in town I am well aware of several documented aggressive tendencies exhibited by this dog since the owners have moved into this house approximately 5-6 months ago. Several of my co-workers have attempted to locate the dog since that time and have also taken several reports of the dog biting people, attempting to bite them, aggressively running at them, barking viciously at them, and various other acts of these nature all while loose in the streets and not leashed or accompanied by an owner. These events have occurred to people of all ages, and on 2 different occasions I am aware of the dog ran towards young children waiting for their school bus. Another neighbor of mine has a small daycare and due to a negative interaction with the dog while it was loose, has had to alter her routine with the children she watches for fear of them being attacked. Just two weeks ago the dog aggressively ran at my dog and I while I was walking him on Los Angeles St. It was loose and unaccompanied on that night as well.

There are multiple recorded concerns and interactions with this dog around the neighborhood, and likely as many if not more undocumented incidents. Most of these instances were aggressive in nature, and all occurred while the dog had escaped his residence by one method or another. It is obviously apparent that the dog's owners are incapable of handling this

dog resulting in all of these incidents. Many neighbors in this neighborhood have dogs, some multiple, and we have never had issues such as this until these neighbors moved in. My wife and I have lived in this neighborhood for 13 years and have never encountered a situation like this, and in conversation with neighbors who have been here much longer than us it has been shared that they have never seen a situation like this since they'd been living here. Most neighbors are afraid to walk in the neighborhood anymore because of this situation, and feel trapped and limited in their ability to enjoy the neighborhood. My wife and I have had to alter our routine with our young child, and have had to warn caretakers to be very cautious while outside as this dog is frequently loose and aggressive. I know of other neighbors who walk with large sticks now for self-defense purposes and avoid that area as much as possible. There should be no such reason that this many people have to alter their routine, including on their own property, to avoid the potential to be attacked by a dog that cannot be properly cared for and maintained within the confines of its residence. Every other dog in this area is maintained properly both by their owner's diligence and as the South Hadley by-laws require of a dog owner. It is beyond time that the neighborhood is able to resume its daily routines without worry of being attacked.


I am writing to express our concern regarding the dog "Brody" from 4 Miami St. South Hadley. We live at 6 Miami St. and have experienced multiple situations with this dog running loose. From the day the new owners moved in, Brody barked loudly at anyone that walked past the house. He barks constantly when placed outside, and he frequently gets away from the owners.

The neighbors have talked among themselves about how he constantly gets loose and we are scared for our own safety and the safety of our animals. On 11/27 at 5:01pm, we received a delivery at our front door. When the delivery man put the package down, Brody charged at him barking all the way. The driver was stuck on our porch, admittedly in fear of the dog. Brody charged and was loudly barking in what appeared to us to be an aggressive manner. He didn't actually advance on the driver, but he wouldn't allow him off of the porch.

The female owner came walking toward our house trying to get Brody. He was dragging a leash. She seemed to me to not take the situation seriously, and joked about Brody's "barking style" and we shouldn't "be worried."

It is not our desire for the dog to be euthanized. It is however our wish that he NOT be allowed back in her care. He is not contained, putting others at risk. He barks constantly, along with her other dogs, and she clearly cannot control him.

On August 24, 2021 at approximately 1221 hrs. I was dispatched to 168 Granby Road South Hadley for a report of an aggressive dog. Upon arrival I spoke with postal carrier William Carmody. Carmody told me he was delivering mail at 6 Miami St. when a light brown dog that appeared to be some type of pit bull cross aggressively lunged at him. Carmody told me he stomped his foot and yelled at the dog first, the dog continued it's pursuit of Carmody when is when he first deployed his OC spray that is provided to him by his employer. Carmody after spraying the dog retreated to the back of the van he was driving. The dog continued to be aggressive and pursue Carmody around the back of the van. Carmody again deployed his OC spray at which time the dog turned and ran down Tampa Street. Carmody believes that if he didn't react as quickly as he did by both continually moving and spraying the dog he would have been bitten.

When performing an area search I found the dog wondering the neighborhood of Tampa St. While following the dog I was greeted by his owner, Brenda Chapdelaine. Chapdelaine told me that she and her husband just recently moved to the area. Her dog's name is Brody and she has never known him to be aggressive but thinks that he was aggressive with the postal carriers because he goes onto their porch daily to deliver the mail.

Eventually Ofc. Tebo and I were able to get the dog to move closer to his home. The gate to the back yard was open and the dog ran into the back yard to avoid me. Once in the backyard I was able to close and lock the gate. I spoke with Chapdelaine and explained that she would receive a call from the town animal control officer.

I called Carmody to update him that we had identified the dog and his owners in case the report is needed.

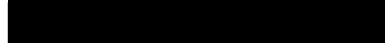

On Sunday, October 3, 2021, I Officer Kretchmar working my assigned 0700-1500 shift was informed by dispatcher O'Neil to follow-up with Yaritza Rodriguez at approximately 0816 in regards to her son being bit by a loose dog.

Upon speaking with Rodriguez, she advised me that her 15-year-old son Miguel Cruz was bit by a yellowish, brown thin haired dog in the area of Miami Street, South Hadley, MA while riding his bike. Rodriguez stated that it happened around 1900 on October 2, 2021 and her son was just telling her now. Rodriguez stated that her son told her that he was riding his bike when the dog charged him and bit him on his left leg. Rodriguez stated that her son did not notice that the bite broke skin until he got home. Rodriguez stated that her son spoke with the owner but did not get any information or remember what he looked like. Rodriguez stated that he only knew it was the owner because he was looking for the dog at the time. I advised Rodriguez to bring her son to hospital in regards to not knowing if the dog has its shots to which she stated that she would.

At approximately 1113, I followed up at 4 Miami Street, South Hadley, MA as I am aware of a dog that has been loose multiple times matching that description that has been sprayed by a mailman and lunged at officers before. I spoke with resident Brenda Chapdelaine who stated that her husband was sleeping as he works nights and was unaware of the situation. I asked Chapdelaine to have her husband contact the PD to which she stated she would tell him as soon as he wakes up. I was able to contact animal control officer Steve Mailhott and made him aware of the situation as he was aware of this dog with the report from the mailman and the dog being on the loose multiple times.

On October 4, 2021, I followed up at 4 Miami Street at approximately 0956 as I did not receive a callback from Chapdelaine's husband Robert Chapdelaine. On arrival I observed B. Chapdelaine chasing her dog in her car as it was loose again. The dog did not listen to B. Chapdelaine and lunged at officers but Ofc. Whelihan was able to grab the dog's leash without any incident. The dog after was fine and did not bite or lunge at officers after running around for approximately an hour. I then advised B. Chapdelaine to wake her husband up to speak with me as she stated that he was sleeping. R. Chapdelaine stated he never spoke with any kids and was not aware that his dog was loose. I asked if there were any other neighbors that watch the dog that would look for it if it was loose to which he stated no. I made both parties aware that I would be contacting animal control in regards to the dog being loose multiple times in the past week, and in regards to the bite.

On October 5, 2021, Rodriguez and her son Cruz came into the station at approximately 0930 to ID the dog. Ofc. Bosowicz was able to show pictures of the dog and Cruz was 90% sure that it was the dog that had bit him. Ofc. Bosowicz informed Rodriguez that the Board of Health and ACO would be speaking with the owner of the dog regarding the status of the dog and its shots.
